





Part of our school vision, mission and values is 'Dare to be remarkable', but this can sometimes be misinterpreted, so it's important to have a shared understanding about what we mean. Some students have suggested that they feel intimidated or pressured at the thought that they need to 'be remarkable'. Even when people might say to us, 'Just do your best!' this can feel pressured, because day-to-day it is not always possible to show up as the best version of ourselves.



Brené Brown, a professor and author who studies courage and vulnerability, says "when we make the choice to dare greatly... we can choose courage or we can choose comfort, but we can't have both. Not at the same time. Vulnerability is not winning or losing; it's having the courage to show up..." It may feel uncomfortable and it may feel vulnerable to try our best, to be our best. But if we don't dare, we will never really know what we are capable of. So what does remarkable look like?

The dictionary tells us that remarkable means "unusual or special and therefore surprising and worth mentioning". Sometimes all the hard work and determination and practice pays off, and being remarkable looks like... winning, or achieving something really quite impressive. But these occasions are actually quite few and far between.

This is where our Getting Life-Ready (GLR) skills are vital. Resilience and commitment are worthy of note and are often unusual in society today. Sometimes life is hard, and tiring, and being remarkable looks like... just showing up, sticking with it being resilient, and persevering.

This came home a massive blow. I felt like a doll in a shop, waiting for someone to choose me. I

even had the tag on me with my name on it, for pity's sake.

"I need some air," I managed to say, stumbling to the back of the train. At the very back there was a balcony. As I stood there, I could just see London disappearing behind space and trees. I leaned over the railing and took in the countryside delightedly.

When we reached the village, we were all placed in a hall and given a cup of water. Then the people started coming in. Slowly at first, then in droves. Some people looked delighted, while others had thunderclouds hovering over their heads. My sense of excitement returned with a shiver. I tried to look as obedient as I could, wiping droplets from my chin and smoothing down my hair and coat.

Penelope, who ran the operation got to her feet and said happily," Thank you for your kindness.

Look at all our lovely children!"

Murmurs ran through the crowd.

"So," she continued, "come and talk to the children. Isn't this exciting!"



Learning Support helps me to have a quiet time to revise or do school work two periods a week. I have support available if I am ever stuck on anything and it is a calming environment if I ever feel overwhelmed or stressed. The staff are very helpful and open.. – student

Learning Support helps me a lot because it is a calm place to revise in. The staff are really supportive and friendly and are always willing to help out if you are struggling with a subject. The students and staff all get along well and it is a positive environment. – student

Learning support helps me with my spellings, I do weekly sessions with Mrs Whitefield, and I already feel much more confident. Miss Cham and Miss Rawal are always positive and willing to help whenever you need a hand. – student

The support offered by LS is fantastic and has enabled our daughter to continue coming in to school and participating in her learning, which seemed impossible a year ago. The LS classroom provides a safe environment where she is able to complete work outside the main classroom if needed. Support groups and counselling addressing specific issues are also a great help. Nurture form is a calm, quiet space for students in Years 7-11 who struggle with attending their regular form to start their school day. Students who would benefit from attending are invited to join. Students can choose between normal form time and nurture form depending on how they are feeling in the morning. Some students only attend nurture, whilst others have a mix of nurture and regular form.

When asked about Nurture form, students said:

I really like coming to nurture form in the mornings as it guarantees a relaxed and positive start to the day, away from the noise and bustle from normal form rooms. If I've had a bad morning, knowing I've got a positive and calm room to come into at school really helps me to take that step into school when if feels more difficult. It's a time to regulate emotions and settle in before joining the wider school community for my lessons. It gives me time to clear my head so I can then focus on my next lesson fully.

Nurture form is really helpful because it's a quite place to come to the morning when the day feels overwhelming. I also like the fact that there is a choice which really helps.

I like how relaxed and calm nurture form is, there's nothing unexpected or disrupted, which means I can read and have a calm start to the morning, which helps me when I'm having a bad day and feel like I might struggle in lessons, so I miss less lesson time.





Venr 9 Textiles










Year 9 have been working on a fashion project called 'Adorn, decorate and embellish' in Textiles.


Cultural Cushions



Maths Fest

On Tuesday 5th March, eight Year 10 students were selected to go to the 2024 Maths Feast at Bishop Ramsey School in Ruislip. This was a regional competition, so there were teams from many schools all over the region, and a combination of grammar, private and co-educational schools competing.

We split into two groups of four, each team individually collaborating through four rounds with a range of topics, including Algebra, Geometry and Proportion. It was a fast-paced competition, with each round lasting around 30 minutes, so encouraged adaptive thinking, teamwork, and resilience. Tactics such as dividing and conquering were in our favour, so it ensured that all participants had to be confident in each topic and promoted trust and collaboration within teams.

Whilst we didn't win, there were rounds with very high scores from both groups, and the competition itself was a great opportunity to test our maths skills. Thank you to Mr Woodward and Mrs Pearce for taking us, and to the Maths Department for organising our participation in this event!

Residential Trips

Venr 12 Geographers visit Swanage

Last week the Year 12 A-level Geography class took a 4-day trip down to Swanage in the southeast of Dorset. We saw many famous geographical landscapes, like Durdle Door, as well as expanding our knowledge on our physical coast studies and human, changing places module.

On our first day, we gathered at school in the morning and began on our coach journey down to Swanage. After a threehour drive, we reached our first destination: Hurst Castle Spit, a hook-shaped shingle spit extending 1.4 miles from the Hampshire shore into the Solent towards the Isle of Wight. There, we examined coastal defences aimed at preserving the spit and conducted an environmental assessment. Our next stop was Barton on Sea, known for its significant sea defences against coastal erosion. We studied various defences here, such as steel sheet piling and groynes, and conducted another environmental assessment for comparison. Our final task was to gather data for a cliff profile using measuring equipment, including measuring the total height of the cliff and the angles at which the geology changed. Later, we settled into our accommodations for the four-day stay and reviewed our data, using it to create a scaled cliff profile depicting different rock types and their positions.





On Tuesday we first drove to Portland to look at the sea defences there that protect the nearby houses from the sea. We looked at the recurved sea wall and the gabions that protect the area from the waves. We also looked at the drainage system put in place to help reduce percolation through the pebbles.

We had a lesson on the geology of the Jurassic coast in Lulworth and then we looked at Stair Hole and Lulworth Cover with our tour guide who explained the different features such as the arches and blowholes in Stair Hole and how the different rock types have impacted the types of features in Lulworth Cove. We then drove a few minutes up the road to Durdle Door where we took more field sketches to annotate of the iconic chalk arch.

On Wednesday we had our urban study day in Swanage town. We started off by walking to the coast to our first and second location to carry out our environmental quality survey. We recorded data such as the amount of litter, building quality, amount of traffic, levels of vegetation etc. We then went off in groups around the town centre where we had to conduct 15 interviews with locals, asking questions such as 'What changes have you seen since you first moved here', and 'How would you describe Swanage'. As well as this, we completed more locations for our environmental quality survey. We then consolidated our data in the evening by writing up our findings.

On our final day, we firstly drove to Studland Bay to look at the sand dunes. In groups, we measured the sand dune succession by measuring the length and angle of each section (defined by the breaks of slope), as well as measuring the temperature, wind speed, vegetation cover and vegetation specie within that area. After lunch we then took a 40-minute walk along the coast to see Old Harry Rocks. When we arrived, we did a field sketch of Old Harry, while Mrs Dixon talked us through the processes that led to the formation of this coastal feature. This included looking at the wave cut notch's, the caves, the arches, the high tide mark, the faults and much more. We added this information to our field sketches, so we had a detailed and labelled diagram in our sketchpads. We then took a 40-minute walk back to the car park, and then took our coach back to the hotel to get our suitcases, and then left the hotel at around 4:30 to drive back to school.



Disneyland Paris



On the evening of the 24th of February, the Disneyland Paris Trip for Year 10 Computer Science and Business students took place, for a total of 3 nights away.

On both days, we could explore the park in groups to go on rides, into shops, and find new places to eat all throughout the day, using the maps and landmarks to navigate around the massive park. Many of the rides and rollercoasters were particularly memorable, each being different and unexpected, leading us to repeat a few of them many times!

On the second day away, Computer Science students attended a seminar in the morning, presented by three speakers, each having a history and jobs in the field of computer science. One speaker was Cristina Criddle, who told us how her job coincides with computer science as a technology reporter, even though her original career did not plan for a future in this field. Additionally, she told us about experiences she has had regarding social media sites, opposition to her work and the development of her job. All the speakers shared a clear passion for computer science and encouraged us to consider all the possibilities of future careers in this field, some of which they presented about, even if they are not explicitly related to computer science, as it is such a wide and evolving career path.

On our final night, we all gathered around the castle to watch the stunning firework and light display, before heading back to the hotel to pack, ready to leave the next day.

We have had over 100 students take part in Football club and fixtures this year. Congratulations to the U13 football team who made it through to the 4th round of the National Cup.




